MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL DISTRICT BUDGET MEETING FOR 2017-18

May 10, 2018

6:00 P.M.

Leavitt Area High School

The meeting was called to order by Superintendent of Schools Kimberly Brandt at 6:02 P.M. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Superintendent Brandt. Superintendent Brandt began reading the preamble.

A motion was made by Elizabeth Bullard and seconded by David Wing to waive the reading of the preamble and move to Article One. Hearing no objections from the floor, Superintendent Brandt moved to Article One.

Article 1: To elect, by ballot, a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

A Motion was made by Eben Shaw, seconded by Jason Breton to nominate Charles Dingman as Moderator. A motion was made by Elizabeth Bullard, seconded by David Wing to cease nominations. Hearing no objections, Superintendent Brandt closed the nominations. Written ballots were cast and the motion to nominate Charles Dingman as Moderator was approved. Charles Dingman was elected Moderator and sworn in. Jennifer Wallace, Sally Hebert, and Angeliec Goulding were sworn in as Clerks. Hearing no objection, the Moderator declared nonresidents to be allowed to speak. Mr. Dingman reviewed the ground rules for the evening.

Article 2: To see if the voters of Maine School Administrative District No. 52 will authorize the Board of School Directors to accept nonresident elementary and/or secondary students on a tuition basis.

A motion was made by Eben Shaw, seconded by Nancy Flick to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 3: To see what sum the District will be authorized to expend for Regular Instruction. **(The Board of School Directors Recommends \$10,238,884.)**

A motion was made by David Wing, seconded by Jason Breton to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 4: To see what sum the District will be authorized to expend for Special Education. **(The Board of School Directors Recommends \$5,500,047.)**

A motion was made by Jason Breton, seconded by Dave Wing to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 5: To see what sum the District will be authorized to expend for Career and Technical Education. **(The Board of School Directors Recommends \$0.00.)**

A motion was made by Jason Breton, seconded by Eben Shaw to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 6: To see what sum the District will be authorized to expend for Other Instruction. **(The Board of School Directors Recommends \$520,671.)**

A motion was made by Eben Shaw, seconded by Jason Breton to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 7: To see what sum the District will be authorized to expend for Student and Staff Support. **(The Board of School Directors Recommends \$2,293,623.)**

A motion was made by Eben Shaw, seconded by Susan Shaw to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Mr. Dingman paused the proceedings and apologized for forgetting to ask Chairperson Bullard for opening remarks. Chairperson Bullard offered opening remarks.

Article 8: To see what sum the District will be authorized to expend for Systems Administration. **(The Board of School Directors Recommends \$557,423.)**

A motion was made by Jason Breton, seconded by Eben Shaw to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 9: To see what sum the District will be authorized to expend for School Administration. **(The Board of School Directors Recommends \$1,604,575.)**

A motion was made by Jason Breton, seconded by Nancy Flick to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 10: To see what sum the District will be authorized to expend for Transportation and Buses. **(The Board of School Directors Recommends \$2,022,286.)**

A motion was made by David Wing, seconded by Jason Breton to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 11: **Article 11:** To see what sum the District will be authorized to expend for Facilities Maintenance. **(The Board of School Directors Recommends \$3,270,938.)**

A motion was made by Jason Breton, seconded by David Wing to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 12: To see what sum the District will be authorized to expend for Debt Service and Other Commitments. **(The Board of School Directors Recommends \$1,219,657.)**

A motion was made by Eben Shaw, seconded by Jason Breton to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 13: To see what sum the District will be authorized to expend for All Other Expenditures. **(The Board of School Directors Recommends \$133,880.)**

A motion was made by Jason Breton, seconded by Eben Shaw to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 14: Essential Programs & Services Allocation: To see what sum the District will appropriate for the total cost of funding public education from pre-kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act and to see what sum the District will raise and assess as each municipality's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from pre-kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act in accordance with the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 15688 **(The Board of School Directors recommends the amounts set forth below):**

Explanation: The school administrative unit's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from pre-kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act is the amount of money determined by state law to be the minimum amount that the District must raise and assess in order to receive the full amount of state dollars.

A motion was made by Nancy Flick, seconded by Jason Breton to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 15: Local Debt Obligation: To see what sum the District will raise and appropriate for the annual payments on debt service previously approved by the District voters for non-state-

funded school construction projects or non-state-funded portions of school construction projects in addition to the funds appropriated as the local share of the District's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from pre-kindergarten to grade 12. **(The Board of School Directors recommends \$339,957.)**

Explanation: Non-state-funded debt service is the amount of money needed for the annual payments on the District long-term debt for major capital school construction projects that are not approved for state subsidy. The bonding of this long-term debt was previously approved by the voters or other legislative body.

A motion was made by Nancy Flick, seconded by Jason Breton to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 16: Food Service Program: To see what sum the District will raise and appropriate in additional local dollars in support of the food service program. **(Recommend \$70,000.)**

A motion was made by Jason Breton, seconded by Susan Shaw to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 17: Local Additional Funds: To see what sum the District will raise and appropriate in additional local funds **(Recommend \$3,479,337)** which exceeds the State's Essential Programs and Services funding model by **(Recommend \$3,479,337)** as required to fund the budget recommended by the Board of School Directors.

The Board of School Directors recommends **\$3,479,337** for additional local funds and gives the following reasons for exceeding the State's Essential Programs and Services funding model by **\$3,479,337**:

- \$3,479,337 is needed to cover the District's costs not fully funded in the Essential Programs and Services funding model. These items include but are not limited to: advanced placement courses, co- and extra-curricular costs, technology coordinators, maintenance and operation costs of our own sewer treatment plant, and inadequate special education funding including the high cost of out-of-district placements.

Explanation: The additional local funds are those locally raised funds over and above the District's local contribution to the total cost of funding public education from pre-kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act and local amounts raised for the annual payment on non-state-funded debt service that will help achieve the MSAD 52 budget for educational programs.

A motion was made by Dave Wing, seconded by Jason Breton to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Vote – 43 (Yes), 3 (No), 1 (Defective). Motion carried.

Article 18: Total Budget: To see what sum the District will authorize the Board of School Directors to expend for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2018 and ending June 30, 2019 from the District's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from pre-kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act, non-state-funded school construction projects, additional local funds for school purposes under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 15690, unexpended balances, tuition receipts, state subsidy and other receipts for the support of schools.
(The Board of School Directors recommends \$27,361,984)

Explanation: This Article does not provide money unless the other articles are approved.

A motion was made by Nancy Flick, seconded by Eben Shaw to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 19: Shall the Board of School Directors be authorized to appropriate and expend for school purposes, in addition to the amount approved in the above articles as the total District budget, any unanticipated gifts, bequests, devised, grants, or revenues from other sources for the Fiscal year beginning July 1, 2018 and ending June 30, 2019?

A motion was made by Nancy Flick, seconded by David Wing to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 20: To see what sum the District will appropriate for Adult and Community Education programs **(The Board of School Directors Recommends \$409,779)** and to see what sum the District will raise as the local share **(The Board of School Directors Recommends \$164,210)**; with the authorization to expend any additional, incidental, or miscellaneous receipts in the interest and for the well-being of the adult education program.

A motion was made by Jason Breton, seconded by Eben Shaw to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 21: In addition to amounts for the operating budget, shall the District raise \$200,000 in additional local funds which exceeds the State's Essential Programs and Services funding model by \$200,000 for the Capital Projects Reserve Fund, and authorize the School Board to expend that sum for expenses related to a new industrial wood chip boiler at LAHS, wastewater treatment plant upgrade and/or industrial chiller at LAHS with other amounts approved by the voters from time-to-time from that fund for that purpose?

The Board of Directors recommends \$200,000 in additional local funds and gives the following reasons for exceeding the State's Essential Programs and Services funding model by \$200,000:

Explanation: The District has a long term capital need that it proposes to fund incrementally to reduce or avoid borrowing.

A motion was made by Jason Breton, seconded by Eben Shaw to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

Article 22: Shall 100% of the anticipated increase in state share of the District's total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 over the amount used in the approved budget for fiscal year 2018-2019 as the result of an increase in the state share of the District's total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 under Chapter 103-A of the Maine Revised Statutes be used to provide a decrease in the local contribution, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 15690, subsection 1, paragraph B, for local property taxpayers for funding public education?

(The Board of School Directors Recommends a "Yes" Vote)

Explanation: If this Article is approved and the District receives more state education subsidy than the amount included in its budget due to an anticipated increase in state share of the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12, 100% of that increase shall be used for the purpose of providing property tax relief, which shall be allocated among the member towns in accordance with adjustments to their shares of the local contribution under Article 14 above.

A motion was made by Nancy Flick, seconded by Bruce Bell to vote on this article by written ballot. Vote – 3 (Yes), 44 (No). Motion failed.

Article 23: Do you favor the formation of a regional service center pursuant to an Interlocal Agreement for the Great Falls Regional Service Center, as approved by the governing bodies of the parties thereto and the Commissioner of the Department of Education?

(The Board of Directors recommends a "Yes" vote.)

A motion was made by Nancy Flick, seconded by John Nutting to approve the Board of School Directors' recommendation. Motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned by Moderator Dingman at 7:36 P.M.
